

Steps for each group member:

- 1. Write the due date in the blank above. Then research your topic.
- 2. Think about an entertaining online show that will teach others about your topic. Then complete your copy of page 2.
- 3. After you write a rough draft of your proposal, ask two group mates to edit it. Make corrections.
- 4. Type the final copy of your proposal.

Steps for the group (after group members have completed the steps above):

- 1. Have each group member share his or her proposal with the group.
- 2. Fold a sheet of construction paper in half. Label the cover "Program Proposals for The Medical Links Channel" and decorate it. Write your group members' names on the back cover.
- 3. As a group, decide on the order in which your shows should be featured. Then staple the proposals inside the cover in that order.
- 4. Plan a presentation that will convince network executives to air your shows.

Project: creating a proposal for a new online-only television program on the Medical Links Channel

Goals:

- to explore specific topics related to autoimmune diseases
- to practice researching a topic (W.7.7; W.8.7)
- to practice informational/explanatory writing (W.7.2; W.8.2) and creative-thinking skills

Materials for each student group: See the list on page 1.

Introducing the project:

- 1. Cut apart a copy of the strips below and place them in a paper bag.
- 2. With students, brainstorm a list of some of their favorite television and online programs. When you have a list of at least 20 shows, challenge the class to categorize the list into different types of programs, such as dramas, comedies, reality shows, documentaries, or talk shows.
- 3. Divide the class into groups of four to six students. Explain that the members of each group have been hired as creative directors for a new online-only television network, The Medical Links Channel. Their job is to write a set of proposals for several new shows for the network.
- 4. Have each student draw a slip from the bag to determine his topic, making sure each student selects a topic that is different from his group mates' topics. Then have him return the slip to the bag.
- 5. Distribute copies of pages 1 and 2. Go over these pages with students. Assign a due date for each student to write in the blank on page 1.





Presentation Pointer

Have each group present its proposals to the class. After all groups have presented, have the class play the role of the network executives and vote on the top three shows. Then have students glue a copy of the strips below onto a large sheet of chart paper, leaving space below each heading. Then have them list the diseases they researched under each heading.
