never even dream of. There is something of yourself that you leave at every meeting with another. Those are the words of Fred Rogers, "Mr. Rogers," whose gentle TV communication drew children (and others) to him over the years. What does that have to do with AARDA?

When AARDA was founded in 1991, we knew that autoimmune patients felt isolated and scared—and for good reason. Hardly anyone had heard of autoimmune disease, and it was not at the top of the discussion list at the doctor's office. Delayed diagnoses created life-threatening, deadly situations. Even with a timely diagnosis, treatment options were few. The connections between various autoimmune diseases were relatively unrecognized. And what about the family connection? Enter the American Autoimmune Related Diseases Association (AARDA).

Mr. Rogers was right. In 1991, we had no idea how significant AARDA as an organization would become; and how we, as individuals, would leave bits of ourselves as we shared our knowledge and experience with autoimmune patients and their families. Nor did we realize at that time just how many Americans were touched by autoimmune disease in one form or another. Very few epidemiology studies had been done. The word "autoimmune" was largely unknown or misunderstood although the turning point in the investigation into autoimmunity had been carried out in the 1950s by Dr. Noel R. Rose, an early mentor of AARDA and Chairman Emeritus of AARDA's Scientific Advisory Board.

Now we look at 2018—still no cure but improved treatments and support for patients (no more "it's all in your head"), very much the result of AARDA efforts. AARDA, and its loyal supporters and volunteers, have been on the front lines.

From our "View from the Top," we are encouraged to see many results of our planning and implementation over the past years:

- Autoimmune research flourishing at the National Institutes of Health and a number of outstanding institutions—still underfunded but carried out by dedicated researchers
- An outstanding, first-of-its-kind in the United States, national autoimmune diagnostic and treatment center,

- the Allegheny Health Network Autoimmunity Institute, with which AARDA is a partner
- A quarter million dollar research grant funded by AARDA to study the cost of autoimmune disease to society and answer the questions of whether coordinated care improves treatments for patients and reduces overall costs
- A functioning Autoimmune Research Network (ARNet) that enables investigators worldwide to enlist patients in clinical research studies
- AARDA-founded-and-facilitated 38-member National Coalition of Autoimmune Patient Groups (NCAPG) which increases the voice of autoimmunity in congressional briefings, Capitol Hill visits, and national media sources, and also gives representation to small groups supporting lesser known autoimmune diseases
- An effective AARDA Advocacy Committee that speaks out on local, state, and national levels
- "Let MI Doctors Decide" state-wide campaign on step therapy, the "fail first" prescription drug policy of insurers, that is preparing to go national as the "Let My Doctors Decide" campaign
- Patient support on many levels—telephone, public programs, AARDA-produced educational brochures, PSAs, print and social media, autoimmune awareness walks, webinars
- Outstanding education and awareness events scientific symposia, congressional briefings, and annual autoimmune summits

We are privileged to bring you this annual "View from the Top," a view of activity and gains made possible through the generosity and faithfulness of AARDA friends.

You are invited to join us—or continue with us—toward advancements in patient services, research discoveries, diagnosis opportunities, and treatment options. A Commentary from AARDA Scientific Advisory Board Chair Betty Diamond, M.D.

Progress in the understanding and treatment of autoimmune disease continues. New therapeutics have been approved, and many more are under investigation in the clinic.

There are three areas of worth highlighting this year that represent new approaches to autoimmune disease.

First, an intense effort has been made over the past several years to identify those at risk for developing an autoimmune disease or those with early evidence of an autoimmune disease. This knowledge is now being translated

into early interventions to prevent the further development of clinical disease. In both type 1 diabetes and rheumatoid arthritis, there are ongoing prevention studies. While it is unrealistic to expect dramatic results from these studies, there is reason to be optimistic that we will develop strategies to retard or prevent the development of disease in some individuals.

Second, the role of the microbiome, especially those bacteria that live in the gut, has been the subject of increasing scrutiny in autoimmune disease. The excitement generated by studies suggesting that a particular bacterium or group of bacteria can predispose to an autoimmune disease rests on the idea that altering the gut microbiome will diminish disease activity. Studies in laboratory models support this idea.

Third, the introduction of what are called "checkpoint inhibitors" as immunotherapy in cancer has shown much promise in controlling tumor growth, but it also has led to autoimmune disease in a substantial

number of patients. While this is a regrettable side effect of therapy, it provides a window into early disease and more information on the immune perturbations leading to autoimmune disease

Opportunities to gain new knowledge continue to outstrip resources. We must continue to make sure that the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and other organizations that fund biomedical research have the necessary support for their mission. AARDA will continue to be a voice for this in Washington, DC, and in communities throughout the country.

—Dr. Diamond heads the work of AARDA's Scientific Advisory Board (SAB) which has members from six countries. Each member actively participates in the work of the SAB through speaking, reviewing proposals, serving in advisory capacities, and representing AARDA as requested. These outstanding researchers and physicians form a truly working Scientific Advisory Board.

Thether I am solving fictitious crimes on "Hallmark Movies & Mysteries" or supporting the autoimmune fight, I play my role as realistically as possible. Touching me most deeply is the role of AARDA National Spokesperson. Nineteen years ago I accepted this volunteer position, determined to make a difference in the autoimmune world. Why did I care?

My family and I had gone through the agonizing experience of losing my younger sister Heather to lupus at the age of 19. Lack of diagnosis and misdiagnosis foiled all our attempts to find an answer to her rapidly failing health. Finally we received a diagnosis and started treatment—too late. Through media interviews, speaking opportunities at public and scientific meetings and congressional briefings, and face-to-face meetings on Capitol Hill, I have been privileged to carry the autoimmune message to varied audiences. Heather's story has brought autoimmune awareness, education, and research opportunities. I have spoken for Heather, for the 50 million Americans afflicted with autoimmune diseases, and for my own two little girls who have been born into a family touched by autoimmune disease.

As I said in a *Reader's Digest* interview some years ago, "I believe that just as important as keeping the memory of a loved one in your mind and in your heart is moving beyond the tragedy and doing something positive in their name."

Can one person make a difference? Yes, each one of us who has been touched by autoimmune disease in some way, who knows the devastating effects of one or more of the 100+ autoimmune diseases, can find a role to play. Whether sharing our autoimmune stories with friends, bringing awareness to physicians and others in our local communities, offering in-kind or volunteer services to AARDA, or contributing financial support toward AARDA's mission, opportunities abound.

Someone you know has an autoimmune disease—maybe you. If you already are active in the autoimmune fight, thank you. If you want to find your role, do as I did—contact AARDA. We welcome you.




